



4. Demonstrated Understanding of the Student (recognition of limits of the study, familiar with research context)
5. Special Merit marks will be awarded for innovative, novel research projects.







How to Die Young at a Very Old Age?



Nir Barzilai, MD

Albert Einstein College of Medicine

Dr. Barzilai is a chaired Professor of Medicine and Genetics and the Director of the Institute for Aging Research at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, which is currently the biggest Center in the world to study the Biology of Aging. This Institute is the home of the Nathan Shock Center of Excellence in the Biology of Aging and the Glenn center for the Biology of Human Aging. His interests focus on several basic mechanisms in the biology and genetics of aging. He is the recipient of an NIH a Merit Award aiming to extend the healthy life span in rodents by biological interventions. He also studies families with centenarians that have provided genetic/biological insights on the protection against aging. Several drugs are developed based, in part, on these paradigm-changing studies. He is a recipient of numerous prestigious awards, including the recipient of the 2010 Irving S. Wright Award of Distinction in Aging Research. Dr. Barzilai is in the board of the American Federation for Aging Research, is its co-scientific director, and has served on several NIA study section. He is also a founder of CohBar Inc., a biotech that develops mitochondrial derived peptides as therapy for aging and its diseases. He is co-PI on the R24 Geroscience (Apollo) grant that is an effort to move the field of aging to translation. He is leading the TAME (Targeting/Taming Aging with MEtformin) multi central study. His work has been profiled by major outlets, including the New York Times, the BBC and PBS' NOVA science now, TEDx talk Science and is the leading feature on the Ron Howard/Jonathan Silberberg/National Geographic film about the Age of Aging.

Sue Yeandle, PhD

*Department of Sociological Studies

Sue Yeandle is Professor of Sociology and Director, CIRCLE (Centre for International Research on Care, Labour & Equalities), University of Sheffield, UK. Her research focuses on policies and practices which affect caring roles throughout the life course and includes carers and their support needs; the paid care workforce; the role of technology in systems of care and support; and comparative international analysis of policy on care, carers and caring. Sue led AKTIVE, a UK academic-industry collaboration on telecare use by older people and its impact on those caring for them, in 2011-14.

Sue is Editor-in-Chief of the International Journal of Care and Caring, a new journal being launched by Policy Press in 2017. She was ARK Atlantic Fellow, Queens Belfast and Ulster Universities in 2015, has held visiting positions in Australia, Canada and Finland, and is a partner in the SSHRC-funded project Gender, Migration and the Work of Care, University of Toronto. Sue participated in the UK Government's Task and Finish Group on Carers in Employment, 2012-13; advised on the Prime Minister's Review of the National Carers' Strategy, 2007-08, and was Special Adviser, House of Commons Work and Pensions Committee Inquiry on Carers, 2007-08.

Sue's recent publications include Combining Paid Work and Family Care: policies and experiences in international perspective (2013, Policy Press, ed. with T Kröger) and the AKTIVE working papers: www.akteive.org.uk. Her next book, Making Caring Matter: the mobilisation of carers and its impact on policy-making around the world, is due in 2018.

In Their Own Words: Discovering Widowhood through Qualitative Research



Deborah van den Hoonaard, PhD
Gerontology Department, St. Thomas University

Dr. Deborah K. van den Hoonaard is a sociologist and professor in the Gerontology Department at St. Thomas University in Fredericton, NB, Canada. Former Canada Research Chair in Qualitative Research and Analysis, she directed the Atlantic Centre for Qualitative Research and Analysis from 2006-2015. She is the Social-Science Editor of the Canadian Journal on Aging.

Dr van den Hoonaard's research focuses on the transitions people experience as they age, particularly women's and men's experiences of widowhood and baby-boomer women's entry into retirement. Her approach recognizes that people are experts in their own lives and, therefore, invites research participants to explain their experiences in their own words and to focus on what is important to them.

She is the author of Qualitative Research in Action: A Canadian Primer (2012, 2015 Oxford University Press), By Himself, The Older Man's Experience of Widowhood (2010, University of Toronto Press), and The Widowed Self: The Older Woman's Journey through Widowhood, published in 2001 by Wilfrid Laurier University Press. She is currently writing new book based on research with a more recent cohort of widows. Van den Hoonaard regularly talks to community groups and the media about her research.

In partnership with her husband, Deborah van den Hoonaard has studied the experiences of Iranian Bahá'í refugees in Atlantic Canada. Together, they have authored The Equality of Women and Men: The Experience of the Bahá'í Community of Canada, which was published in 2006 and Essentials of Thinking Ethically in Qualitative Research (Left Coast Press, 2013).

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
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
